


# CHRIST CHURCH 'IN PERSON' WORSHIP

Following the Government's removal of most Coronavirus restrictions on Monday 19<sup>th</sup> July, Sunday worship at Christ Church has changed:

- There is now no longer a requirement to register when you enter, or to use Track & Trace. The QR code will remain available and attendees are encouraged to use it.
- There will be ongoing provision of hand sanitiser: please use it.
- Masks are required in pews that are against the wall in the North aisle, for comfort and protection of those who feel vulnerable or concerned.
- Masks are optional in all other pews
- Balcony is open for those who would rather keep a greater distance.
- To maintain distancing, every other pew continues to be cordoned off.
- The Congregation can now sing: masked or unmasked!
- At Holy Communion, the situation remains unchanged. The Priest only to receive wine, the bread is shared by all communicants.
- We will continue to share The Peace from the pews.
- We will aim to provide coffee/tea/squash and biscuits in the Harwood Hall after the main Sunday morning act of worship September onwards.

Be assured that we will make every effort to protect the vulnerable and make our worship together joyful and God centred.

## VICAR'S WRITES: BE YOURSELF

Monty Python the much loved and influential British surreal comedy troupe originally active through the 1970s and early 1980s have left a huge legacy. Three of their six members have been voted among the top 50 greatest comedians ever, and their TV shows and feature films have provided quotes and catchphrases that still live on.

Among the sketches and weird silliness were collage stop-motion animation segments created by animator Terry Gilliam, that took images from famous works of art and Victorian illustrations and engravings.

After working on Monty Python, Gilliam went on to become a feature film director, directing among others *Time Bandits*, *12 Monkeys*, and the Academy Award Nominated *Adventures of Baron Munchausen*.

The titular character of the fictional movie was based on a real baron, one Hieronymus Karl Friedrich, Freiherr von Münchhausen. In the middle of the 18<sup>th</sup> century, the baron became a minor celebrity for telling outrageous tales loosely based on his military career. As these stories were recorded, the preposterous nature of them grew, as at times he was said to have claimed to have ridden a cannonball, fought a 40ft crocodile and travelled to the moon.

Such has been the impact of these stories, that his name has become associated with a physiological disorder where an individual produces symptoms of a condition to draw attention to themselves.

In a world of more than seven billion people the desire to be something special has led to extraordinary acts of human endurance, bravery, or

sometimes lunacy. Even among smaller groups, exaggerating a quirk or character trait to become interesting or fascinating can be a huge temptation.

One time, Jesus spoke about how God has counted the number of hairs on the heads of each of us. It echoes a Psalm where we can read how God has known us before we were born. He knows us completely and intimately. There is nothing about us that is hidden from him. We don't need to pretend, put on an act or pass ourselves off as something we are not.

Whether we have wrestled a crocodile or just wrestled with self-doubt, God knows us and loves us.

# FRIENDSHIP CLUB PROGRAMME

organisations. They hope to acquire larger premises soon so they can offer services from Monday-Friday. They provide a valuable shelter too over several days every Christmas.

Our Churchwardens Barbara and Chris were formally Admitted to their roles during a special act of worship at Trinity Church on 27<sup>th</sup> September.

As it was not possible for everyone from Christ Church to be in attendance, on the next two pages is an extract from the Order Of Service. Hopefully this will give an appreciation of the event, and offer the chance for us all to pray for our Churchwardens.

The retiring wardens sit, and the Registrar (or Archdeacon) invites those wardens to be admitted to office to stand and says:

The Church is the body of Christ, and through baptism every member is called to ministry and to service. You are called to special responsibilities. With your clergy, you are to share in the administration of the parish and the care of the church buildings. You are to promote the whole mission of the Church, which is pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. These things you are called to do for the glory of God and for the well-being of Christ's Church. To him therefore, upon whose grace we rely, and in whose love we trust, let us dedicate ourselves, our lives and work, praying together.

The churchwardens pray:

Almighty God by whose grace alone we are accepted and called to your service; Strengthen us by your Holy Spirit and make us worthy of our calling, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Brothers and sisters, whom God has called to serve in the office and duty of churchwarden, I ask you to make your solemn promise and declaration and say together:

The churchwardens say:

I solemnly and sincerely declare before God and his people that I will faithfully and diligently discharge the duties of the office of churchwarden for the parish for which I have been chosen during the period of my appointment.

The Archdeacon says:

I admit each one of you to the office of churchwarden for the coming year, in the name of God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. May the Lord be with you as you serve him in this office. **Amen.** 

All stand with the churchwardens:

Living God,

your love has sustained us, your wisdom has guided us.

We thank you for the joy and encouragement you give.

Fill us, your servants, with your Spirit,

that we may daily listen to your voice and grow in understanding of your word, faithfully making known your salvation.

Renew our churches, parishes and deaneries, in unity and mission, that all who love you may work for the coming of your Kingdom and see your glory revealed among us

in the power of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

God of our pilgrimage,

you have led us to the living water; refresh and sustain us as we go forward on our journey, in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

# EDITOR'S ROUND UP: FREE TO BE ME

As a school pupil I came to Christ Church around a dozen times for end of term services. So it was perhaps a natural instinct which drew me inside later on as a young adult when I needed help.

I was a dance student on a limited income when I began a relationship with a man who at first seemed like a good, kind person. He bought me trendy clothes and jewellery. This included a locket containing both our photos which he insisted I had to wear every day.



He did not like me spending time with my friends and I lost touch with them all. My parents thought he was too possessive and controlling. At first I did not understand what they meant. Then he began to demand I should give up my dancing career, and became angry and violent when I refused.

Wandering into Christ Church one morning I prayed for strength to escape from him and make new friends. The Curate, Tony Wilcox, saw me and invited me to the evening service, and the youth club afterwards. I was impressed God had answered my prayer so quickly!

After leaving my boyfriend the last thing I received from him was a card bearing the words: "Now your dreams won't come true." Well, I achieved many of my ambitions, which he would never have allowed me to fulfil. There is a certain kind of person who enjoys bullying and having power over others. No one has the right to behave like that.

I found real freedom in a relationship with Jesus, who helps us to develop our talents. *"No eye has seen, no ear has heard, no heart has imagined, what God has prepared for those who love Him."* (1 Corinthians 2:9.)
